

<u>Directions</u>: The <u>climax</u> of the story is the point of greatest interest or suspense in the story. It is the turning point in the story where the action reaches its peak. The <u>climax</u> is usually the <u>most exciting part</u> of the story and <u>something worth barking about!</u>

<u>Directions</u> : The <u>conclusion</u> of the story is when the main character solves the problem. <u>The story usually ends happily</u> and it is <u>a tail</u> wagging event!
